




UNCRC



Rung 3: Young people tokenized*

Rung 2: Young people are decoration*

Rung 1: Young people are manipulated*



What is gender equality?



Gender equality is a situation in which access to rights or opportunities is unaffected by gender.

This means equality in all areas for men and women.

No one should be discriminated against because of their gender.

"Gender equality is not a woman's issue, it is a human issue. It affects us all."





The challenges



All-boy context

Student and staff survey on sexism highlighted issues in attitudes amongst some students

Sexism towards female staff

Outside influences, such as poor role models on social media



Tackling stereotypes around 'feminism' and equality







Working with the local girls school to discuss and work on issues of gender inequality locally

Student led assemblies in 'inclusivity week' to raise awareness of social issues

Donating to local foodbanks where women in poverty seek support

Highlighting key events such as International Women's Day, using this as an opportunity to discuss where women still face inequality in the modern world

Extensive staff training on how to tackle sexism and misogyny in school

Inserting more women into the curriculum, highlighting their extensive successes

How can students make a change by advocating for Gender Equality?



Listen to those around you

Be critical about stereotypes

Be reflective of social media

Challenge language

Advocate for change in small and big ways

Read up about the issue globally





What will this do?



Allows people to be heard, not ignored

Challenges stereotypes that have been often used to further inequality in the workplace, in relationships, and in social spaces

Discourages unfair and discriminatory betrayals of gender on social media.

Also challenges those promoting gender inequality to be more reflective

Discourages
discriminatory language
that contributes to
inequality

Starting small changes such as supporting women in sports can lead to bigger and even more positive widespread changes. Everything starts at a local level.

Knowledge of global issues gives you more awareness as to world issues, this can lead to your involvement in the solution later down the line.

Knowledge is power.



Educating others ensures the ripple effectthe more people advocating for equality, the more widespread the change will be.

PROMOTING EDMUND RICE INTERNATIONAL IN SCHOOLS

ERI Mission Statement

An ERI Partner School would be presented annually with a Mission Statement produced by ERI in consultation with Regional Advocacy Coordinators which clearly explains the commitment required of an ERI Partner School. Each school should display this clearly and prominently within school and on websites.

ERI Staff Ambassadors

As well as student Ambassadors, a Partner School would appoint an ERI Staff Ambassador to serve an annual term. However, they would retain that status thereafter so that each Partner School develops a Network of staff who have served as ERI Staff Ambassadors and who continue to support students and each other.

Training Opportunities & Resources for Staff Ambassadors

- ERI Online Course
- Staff Advocacy Workshop (delivered by Regional Advocacy Coordinator)
- Geneva In-Person Training (January / May / November)
- EREBB Leadership Certificate

ERI Youth Ambassadors

All ERI Partner Schools would appoint at least two ERI Youth Ambassadors for the academic year. Ambassadors would serve an annual term and have increased opportunity for training, engagement with ERI, and communication with counterparts across the world.

Social Justice Action Plan

ERI Partner Schools would adopt and promote the Social Justice Action Plan committing to *at least* one from the local, global, or eco-campaign options for the school year. The local campaign could be one of their choosing (supported by the Regional Advocacy Coordinators), whilst the eco and global campaigns would be selected from a list of ERI-approved campaigns developed by the ERI team and global network of Regional Advocacy Coordinators.

PROMOTING EDMUND RICE INTERNATIONAL IN SCHOOLS

ERI Approved Campaigns and Campaign Showcase

Each year the global network of Regional Advocacy Coordinators would be invited by ERI to submit campaigns they wish to publicise from their area. A selection of these campaigns (the ones that offer clear and realistic opportunity for school involvement) would be approved by ERI and circulated to Partner Schools. A Partner School should choose their Social Justice Action Plan Campaigns from this 'menu' of options.

As part of this process, we would invite each justice desk and/or Regional Advocacy Coordinator to promote their campaign by creating a short presentation (video/Powerpoint etc.) which explains and outlines their campaign. A Partner School should ensure these promotional resources inform the selection of campaigns in their school.

Roles and Responsibilities

Staff Ambassadors will:

- Participate in at least one form of Advocacy Training (either online or in person)
- Manage ERI Groups and Appoint Youth Ambassadors
- Facilitate delivery of Classroom Modules for students
- Supervise and oversee campaigns run by students
- Attend annual/periodic YA gathering/exchange/sharing event

Youth Ambassadors will:

- Attend Induction Training
- Participate in ERI Group
- Promote campaigns and activities (to ERI and the wider school community)
- Participate in annual/periodic YA gathering/exchange/sharing event

COURAGEOUS LEADERSHIP – AN ONLINE GLOBAL LEADERSHIP SHORT COURSE FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

where to start. The teachers in your schools who have this responsibility may find these resources useful.


